The bird in question was perched on a tall dried stick/weed. There was nothing between it and us so was easy to see. The bird would fly out to catch an insect then return to the perch. It was Kingbird size, with varying shades of gray for the back, head and wings, with a yellow belly. The yellow started about 1/3 of the way down from the throat. Above that it was pale gray. When it flew we could see the tail had no white on the outer tail feathers, but had a pale tip. This wasn't very noticeable so we assumed we were looking at a worn bird. Also the patch just under the bill was not as noticeable as in birds in the spring and early summer, also an indication of a worn bird.
