Dark brownish wren with a long tail and no discernable eye line. Shape, bill & tail were that of a wren rather than a sparrow or finch as was the behavior - out on a bare branch, flicking its tail from side to side and peering down toward the ground as if something was there. I couldn't hear scolding but the heater was running in the vehicle and there were other birds closer to us chattering (WSP). I looked closely for an eyeline as Bewick's wren would be the expected wren given the brushy stream-side habitat but the face was very plain. Tail was too long for a marsh wren & the back was very dark - no noticeable color difference anywhere on this bird.
