I saw a dark bird feeding with hundreds of light geese in a field managed for cranes and geese. The Greater-White-fronted goose had bright orange feet and legs and an orange bill with a dark tip, suggesting juvenile. Bright white patch at base of bill extending up to forehead. White undertail coverts, and overall dark body. Breast and belly gray w/o much patterning. Distinguished from Dark morph snow goose by bill & leg color, white patch at base of bill. Though this individual does appear to have a dark ~~g~~ line running horizontally on bill, much less hairy than SNGO "grin patch."

Three ♀ Blue-winged teal were swimming with a large group of ducks on a pond that had dried stems of water plants breaking the surface of the water and providing a bit of shelter. I would not have noticed these three, except that one duck stretched her wing, revealing baby blue. Upon closer inspection, I noted the white at the base of the bill and throat. All three of their bills were less spatulate than a cinnamon teal. The face was quite gray, not warm-colored. They swam in and out of the plants for many minutes before passing behind bushes and out of sight.
